We saw the inauguration of an unpopular president and then the unprecedented success of the Women's March on Washington. That was the beginning of an era of activism and a renewed commitment by progressives to recoup the losses of the past eight years.

A new year dawns in July bringing with it new WNDC leadership and many expectations. Our new members have spoken, and their message is loud and clear. Their priority is political action. They want to create a vigorous Get-Out-the-Vote initiative; harness the disparate forces in DC, Maryland and Virginia; and bring success in down-ballot races in 2017, 2018, and 2020. HILLWOOD MUSEUM AND GARDEN TOUR

TIME: Arrive by 10:15 am. Tour of gardens begins at 10:30 and mansion at 11:30. Light lunch at Hillwood Cafe, 12:30 pm (separate purchase)



Hillwood was the magnificent home of Marjorie Merriweather Post (1887-1973). One of the richest women in the world, she inherited the Postum Cereal Company, later expanded into the General Foods Corporation. Owner of many great residences, including Mar-a-Lago in Florida, she bought Hillwood in 1955 and decided that it would become a museum for her collection of Russian imperial art (the most comprehensive outside of Russia) and distinguished 18th-century French decorative art. Encompassing 25 acres of landscaped gardens and natural woodlands, it is the largest privately held residence in DC. A great philanthropist, Mrs. Post was a donor to the WNDC, providing funds in 1966 to restore the main drawing room, which now bears her name and features a beautiful portrait of her.

They have played Motown, Disco and 70's Funk dance music all over the world for dignitaries and heads of state. "Right On" is the only band in America to have played for four U.S. presidential inaugurations.



DNC UPDATE



DNC Update

After teaming up with Senator Bernie Sanders to “take the Democratic message to the people where they are,” DNC Chair Tom Perez is moving forcefully on three fronts:

DNC Transition: The 2017 DNC Transition Advisory Committee, which began meeting in April, comprises 36 members including at least 7 non-winning candidates for various DNC offices—a good sign that Chair Perez and Deputy Chair Keith Ellison recognize value of including these talented DNC candidates in leadership.

The Transition Committee is charged with 1) building a Party that reaches into and represents every corner of America; 2) expanding and strengthening partnerships, identifying outreach opportunities, and bolstering grassroots organizing; and 3) communicating effectively across all channels and spectrums.

Each committee member will join one of four working groups to: 1) build lasting coalitions with progressive groups and other Democratic allies; 2) organize and win in red and rural states; 3) strengthen state parties and create new entry ways; and 4) reach out and mobilize core Democratic constituencies. Unity Reform Commission: The Unity Reform Commission, which first met in DC on May 5-6, was created at the 2016 Democratic National Convention at the urging of predominantly Bernie delegates with grave concerns about transparency issues regarding caucuses (rather than primaries) and delegates not pledged to any presidential candidate (the so-called “super delegates”). The 21 person Commission comprises 9 Hillary appointees, 7 Bernie appointees, and 3 appointed by the DNC Chair. The Commission is conducting a review of the nominating process over the course of 2017. It will submit its report of recommendations to the DNC Rules and Bylaws Committee by January 1, 2018. The Commission’s recommendations will concentrate on the following areas:

- Increasing participation in the presidential nominating process
- Empowering the Party and its candidates to be more competitive in all regions
- Involving new and unaffiliated voters
- Revising delegate selection rules on unpledged delegates
- Supporting redistricting efforts
- Broadening the base of the party at the grassroots level
- Expanding the DNC’s donor base.

The Commission will hold at least three more meetings in other regions during 2017. (To learn more about the Unity Reform Commission and how to participate, visit www.democrats.org/unity-commission.)

Nationwide Resistance Summer Program: The DNC and State Democratic Parties will partner with state parties and external allies on local organizing efforts designed to bolster state parties and win elections up-and-down the ticket. The mission of Resistance Summer is to educate, organize, and mobilize grassroots energy from Democrats in all 57 states, territories, and Democrats Abroad to help build the Party’s base of political power and resist Trump’s attacks on hardworking families. Under this competitive matching grant program, the DNC will approve and fund programs that will be executed by state parties.

On Saturday, June 3, State Parties and allied groups will hold events across the country to kick off Resistance Summer, and WNDC will be involved. (To learn more and to participate, visit www.democrats.org or doyle@dnc.org).

If You Want to Get Involved: If you are interested in being part of the 2020 presidential nominating and election process, **stay in touch with your State Democratic Party RIGHT NOW!!!** It is through the state democratic parties that potential activists, candidates, and delegates **learn the rules** in time to take part effectively. A major problem for many involved in Bernie’s candidacy was that his followers did not know Democratic Party processes for delegate selection and nor did he—mainly because most of them had never been involved in the Democratic Party process before. So **DON’T LET THAT HAPPEN TO YOU!!!!**
